

- 2. Who is the audience?
- 3. When was it written?
- 4. What is its purpose?
- 5. What is the context (historical, literary, and biblical)?

What comes before/after my passage? How does this fit within the book? how does it fit within the testament? How does it fit within the Bible?



How does this point to or reflect on the gospel? How is Jesus foreshadowed? What does this say about the person/work of Jesus?



Is there a command to obey? Is there something I need to pray? How can I respond?

what about this passage is important for how God unfolds His redemptive purposes?



How does this speak to the unbeliever? How does it call him/her to repentance? What does it say about their situation?



What does this say about our lives/roles in the public square, both as Christians and non-Christians (e.g., govt., neighborhood)



How does this point to Christ? How is He depicted?



How does this demonstrate the unity we have in Christ? How does it reflect our diversity? The life of the church?



What does this say about our work? Our relationships with employees/employer?



What does this say about our family? Roles within the family? Gender?



What does this mean for us as Christians? How does it call us to repentance/faith? Are we warned, rebuked, or motivated?
